Community Supervision Legislative Report 2012

This report was produced in response to legislation enacted in 2011 that merged the former Department of Correctional Services and the former Division of Parole into the Department of Corrections and Community Supervision. That legislation required the Commissioner of the new agency to provide an annual report to the legislature regarding: offenders released from prison to community supervision, offenders supervised on community supervision, offenders whose community supervision was revoked for violating the conditions of release, offenders who were returned to prison for a new offense, and offenders under community supervision who were transferred out of state to be supervised. This report provides the legislature with the required information. All references to community supervision refer to parole supervision; offenders on probation are not included in the report.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- In 2011, 6,622 or 29% of releases to community supervision were Board Releases. This is a decrease of 9,004, or 58%, since 2002. This decrease is primarily a result of the change in drug offender sentencing from indeterminate to determinate beginning in 2007.
- More than one-third (37%) of offenders entering community supervision during 2011 were committed for either a Violent Felony Offense or an A1 Violent offense. Less than one-third (31%) of the offenders entering community supervision during 2011 were committed for a drug offense.
- Between 2002 and 2011, the proportion of VFO or A1 Violent offenders entering community supervision increased from 28% to 37%. During the same period of time, the proportion of drug offenders entering community supervision decreased from 45% to 31%.
- Since 2007, the number of offenders under community supervision has declined from 42,991 to 37,597, which represents a decrease of 13%. This reduction is consistent with the 12% decrease in the prison population during the same time period.
- The number of offenders under community supervision for drug offenses decreased from 16,206 at the end of 2007 to 10,830 at the end of 2011. This represents a decrease of 5,376, or 33%, in drug offenders under community supervision over the last four years. The proportion of drug offenders under community supervision decreased from 38% at the end of 2007 to 29% at the end of 2011.
- Between 2007 and 2011, the number of violation outcomes decreased by 19%, from 16,506 in 2007 to 13,435 in 2011.
- The number of offenders returned to prison for new felony convictions annually has declined 32% since 2002.
- The majority of discharges from supervision (79%) were a result of offenders completing their maximum terms of community supervision.
- At the end of 2011, there were 1,395 offenders from New York who were being supervised out of state under the Interstate Compact.
- At the end of 2011, there were 986 offenders from other states who were being actively supervised in New York under the Interstate Compact.

Section 1 – Offenders Released to Community Supervision

There are four major mechanisms through which offenders are released from incarceration to parole supervision in the community: 1) Board of Parole decision, 2) Presumptive Release, 3) Conditional Release, and 4) other release. Board releases are the result of the Parole Board making decisions to release offenders from prison to parole supervision. Board releases include releases as a result of final deportation and Shock hearings. Presumptive releases are releases from prison in which the Commissioner of the Department of Corrections and Community Supervision made determinations that offenders should be released from prison after having served at least 5/6 of their minimum sentences. For these releases, the Board of Parole does a paper review of the offender to set the conditions of parole supervision in the community. Conditional releases are releases in which offenders have reached their conditional release dates (6/7 of a determinate sentence; 2/3 of an indeterminate sentence) and are automatically released from prison on that date, unless good time has been lost while in prison. The other release category includes: being on parole supervision in another state and requesting movement to New York (Cooperative cases), being judicially sentenced to parole supervision (i.e., Judicially Sentenced to the Willard Drug Treatment Campus), being a juvenile offender who ages into the adult criminal justice system and is placed on parole supervision, being placed on parole supervision directly from local jail, and being placed on a specialized sex offender caseload in the community after a determination is made by the court (SIST¹).

- In 2011, 6,622 or 29% of releases to community supervision were Board Releases. This is a decrease of 9,004, or 58%, since 2002. This decrease is primarily a result of the change in drug offender sentencing from indeterminate to determinate beginning in 2007.
- Presumptive releases began in 2003 and peaked in 2005 at 2,075 releases. Since then, the number of presumptive releases has decreased by 92% to 158 releases in 2011.
- The number of conditional releases has increased by 7,145 or 89% between 2002 and 2011. This is a result of changes in sentencing in New York which have changed offenders' sentenced from primarily indeterminate to primarily determinate.

¹ SIST stands for Strict and Intensive Supervision and Treatment. Sex offenders can be placed on this type of community supervision caseload as part of the civil management process in New York. Offenders must be referred (usually by the Department of Corrections and Community Supervision) for civil management prior to release from prison or discharge from parole supervision and evaluated by the Office of Mental Health (OMH). If OMH determines that the offender suffers from a "mental abnormality", the case is referred to the Attorney General for possible litigation. If the Attorney General proceeds with litigation, the offender is entitled to a jury trial; a unanimous verdict is required for an offender to be involuntarily confined or placed under intensive supervision. If the court finds that the offender warrants Civil Management, but can safely be supervised in the community, he or she will be allowed to live in the community while supervised on a SIST caseload, as long as he or she complies with all the conditions set by the Parole Board, does not break the law and receives the treatment he or she needs. - Overall, the number of releases to community supervision fluctuated between 2002 and 2007. Since 2007, when there were 25,909 releases, the number of releases to parole supervision in the community has decreased by 2,731 or 11% to 23,178 releases in 2011.
- More than one-third (37%) of offenders entering community supervision during 2011 were committed for either a Violent Felony Offense or an A1 Violent offense. Less than one-third (31%) of the offenders entering community supervision during 2011 were committed for a drug offense.
- Between 2002 and 2011, the proportion of VFO or A1 Violent offenders entering community supervision increased from 28% to 37%. During the same period of time, the proportion of drug offenders entering community supervision decreased from 45% to 31%.

OFFENDERS ENTERING COMMUNITY SUPERVISION: 2002 TO 2011

During 2011, 23,107 offenders entered community supervision. Violent Felony Offenders and A1 Violent Offenders constituted more than one-third (37%) or 8,600 of these cases. Nearly one-third (31%) of all cases entering community supervision during 2011 were drug offenders.



Section 2 – Offenders Under Community Supervision


This section presents information about offenders who were under parole supervision in the community as of December 31 of a particular year. This population reflects offenders under active supervision. Offenders on temporary release from prison and in community preparation status are excluded from the figures.

- Since 2007, the number of offenders under community supervision has declined from 42,991 to 37,597, which represents a decrease of 13%. This reduction is consistent with the 12% decrease in the prison population during the same time period.
- While the total number of offenders under community supervision decreased between 2007 and 2011, the number of offenders under community supervision for violent offenses increased by 850, from 16,680 at the end of 2007 to 17,530 at the end of 2011. The proportion of offenders under community supervision for a violent offense increased from 39% at the end of 2007 to 47% at the end of 2011.
- The number of offenders under community supervision for drug offenses decreased from 16,206 at the end of 2007 to 10,830 at the end of 2011. This represents a decrease of 5,376, or 33%, in drug offenders under community supervision over the last four years. The proportion of drug offenders under community supervision decreased from 38% at the end of 2007 to 29% at the end of 2011.
- About half (51%) of the offenders under community supervision on December 31, 2011 were African-American. The median age of these offenders was 37 and over half (55%) were from New York City. The large majority (94%) of offenders under supervision were male.
- Two-thirds of offenders under community supervision had a drug abuse history.
- Six percent of offenders under community supervision at the end of 2011 were female. Among female offenders, 33% were convicted of drug offenses. The next largest crime category among female offenders was Legislative VFO, which represented 29% of offenders.
- Of the offenders under community supervision, 2,351 or 6% were registered sex offenders. Nearly half (43% or 1,009) of these offenders were assigned to the highest risk category, level 3.
- On December 31, 2011, there were 100 Juvenile Offenders under community supervision.

OFFENDERS UNDER COMMUNITY SUPERVISION: December 31, 2002 to December 31, 2011

The proportion of Violent Felony Offenders and A1 Violent Offenders among those under supervision has increased in recent years primarily due to early discharge options for non-violent offenders. As of December 31, 2011 nearly half (47 percent) of all offenders under Community Supervision were Violent Felony Offenders while nearly one-third (29 percent) were drug offenders.



Section 3 - VIOLATION PROCESS

There are three major outcomes associated with violations of the conditions of parole supervision: returns to prison, placement in alternative programs, and returns to the community. An offender can be ordered returned to prison to serve a time assessment imposed at a parole revocation hearing. It is possible that an offender will serve the full time assessment in local jail rather than prison because he or she was also facing local criminal charges. Another sanction that can be imposed for the violation of parole supervision is placement in an alternative program, such as Willard. Finally, an offender can have his or her parole supervision revoked, but be restored to community supervision with an additional condition to participate programming in the community.

- Between 2007 and 2011, the number of violation outcomes decreased by 19%, from 16,506 in 2007 to 13,435 in 2011.
- Offenders who had a parole violation that resulted in the revocation of parole supervision and return to prison make up the largest category of violation process outcomes. In 2011, 65% of violations resulted in a decision of Revoke and Ordered Returned to Prison.
- Between 2007 and 2011, the number of violations resulting in offenders being returned to prison decreased by 22%. During that time period, the proportion of Revoke and Ordered Returned to Prison decisions decreased from 68% to 65%.
- In 2007, 19% of violations resulted in placement at Willard (including the Alt 90 program). By 2011, the proportion of violations resulting in placement at Willard or in the Edgecombe Alt 45 program had increased to 22%.
- Although substantial numbers of cases are now going to Willard through the Alternative 90 Day program, the total number of Willard cases has remained consistent relative to the size of the supervised population.
- Between 2007 and 2011, the total violation outcomes in which an offender was Ordered Returned to Prison, Willard or an Alternative program decreased slightly, from 87% to 86%. Conversely, the total violation outcomes resulting in a Revoke and Restore to the Street or Program increased from 13% to 14% during the time period.

Section 4 – OFFENDERS LEAVING COMMUNITY SUPERVISION

Offenders leave community supervision as a result of being returned to prison or successfully discharged. Offenders are returned to prison either for violating the conditions of release or being convicted of a new offense. Offenders are discharged after reaching their Maximum Expiration date, thereby completing their sentence, or through one of the early discharge mechanisms, including Merit Termination, Mandatory Termination, and Board Three Year Discharge.

- The number of offenders returned to prison for new felony convictions annually has declined 32% since 2002, from 2,194 to 1,498. These returns made up 6% of all removals from supervision in 2011, down from 9% in 2002.
- Among the 54,553 offenders who spent at least some time under active supervision in 2011, less than 3% were returned to prison with new court convictions.
- There were 9,186 rule violators removed from community supervision in 2011, including the 1,412 successful completions of the Alternate 90 Day and Alternate 45 Day programs. Rule violators represented 17% of the 54,553 offenders who spent at least some time under active supervision in 2011.
- In 2011, the most prevalent original crime of commitment among offenders returned to prison for rule violations and new commitments was A1 Violent or Legislative VFO, followed by Drug Offenses. Since 2002, the proportion of A1 Violent/Legislative VFO offenders amongst the rule violators has steadily increased while the proportion of Drug Offenders has continually decreased. This is consistent with the changes in the representation of these offenses among the supervised population.
- Discharges from community supervision comprised 56% of all removals in 2011. The majority of these discharges, 10,923 of the 13,742 discharges, were a result of offenders completing their maximum terms of community supervision.
- Merit Discharges made up 17% of discharges in 2011.
- The number of offenders discharged by Mandatory Termination has declined by 80% since its inception in 2005 as a result of sentencing changes for drug offenders from indeterminate to determinate.

ORIGINAL CRIME OF COMMITMENT**

The number of Drug Offenders returned to prison after conviction of a new felony has decreased by 60 percent since 2002.

This reflects the combined impact of decreases in the drug offender population under supervision and significant numbers of drug offenders returned for rule violations before they commit new crimes. In 2011, 470 Drug Offenders were returned to DOCCS for committing new crimes.

In 2011, 3,487 Violent Felony Offenders were returned to prison for rule violations. As the proportion of Drug Offenders under supervision has decreased, the number of drug offenders returned to prison for rule violations has also decreased. In 2002, nearly half (48%) of all rule violation returns were drug offenders. In 2011, less than one-third (31%) of rule violation returns were drug offenders.

Section 5 – OFFENDERS SUPERVISED OUT OF STATE

- At the end of 2011, there were 1,395 offenders from New York who were being supervised out of state under the Interstate Compact.
- Between 2007 and 2011, the number of offenders being supervised out of state decreased by 120 or 8%.
- During 2011, 735 offenders were transferred out of New York to complete their community supervision under the Interstate Compact. This is a decrease of 93 or 11% from the 828 transfers in 2010.

Section 6 – OFFENDERS SUPERVISED FROM OTHER STATES

- At the end of 2011, there were 986 offenders from other states who were being actively supervised in New York under the Interstate Compact.
- Between 2007 and 2011, the number of offenders from other states being supervised increased by 191 or 24%.
- During 2011, 521 offenders were transferred from other states to New York to complete their community supervision under the Interstate Compact. This is an increase of 40 or 8% from the 481 transfers in 2010.
