Community Supervision Legislative Report 2013

This report was produced in response to legislation enacted in 2011 that merged the former Department of Correctional Services and the former Division of Parole into the Department of Corrections and Community Supervision. Correction Law §201(15) requires that, “The commissioner shall provide an annual report to the temporary president of the senate, the speaker of the assembly, the minority leader of the senate and minority leader of the assembly, commencing January first, two thousand twelve. Such report shall include but not be limited to the number of persons: released to community supervision and the release type; supervised on community supervision during the preceding year; whose community supervision was revoked; returned to incarceration for conviction of a new felony committed while on community supervision; transferred out of state pursuant to the Interstate Compact for Adult Supervision.”

All references to community supervision refer to parole supervision; parolees on probation are not included in the report.

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The 22,815 releases to supervision during 2012 represent a 10% decrease from the 25,414 releases in 2003.
- In 2012, 6,224 or 27% of releases to community supervision were Board Releases. This is a decrease of 9,713, or 61%, since 2003. This decrease is primarily a result of the change in drug offender sentencing from indeterminate to determinate beginning in 2004.
- Between 2003 and 2012, the proportion of VFO or A1 Violent Offenders released to community supervision increased from 28% to 39%. During the same period of time, the proportion of Drug Offenders released to community supervision decreased from 44% to 27%.
- Since 2007, the active parolee population under community supervision has declined from 42,367 to 36,577, which represents a decrease of 14%. This reduction is consistent with the 14% decrease in the prison population during the same time period.
- While the total number of parolees under community supervision decreased between 2007 and 2012, the number of parolees under community supervision for violent offenses increased from 16,527 (39%) at the end of 2007 to 18,126 (50%) at the end of 2012.
- The number of parolees under community supervision for drug offenses decreased 41% from 15,830 at the end of 2007 to 9,274 at the end of 2012.
- The COMPAS supervision model was implemented in January 2012. Supervision levels 1 through 4, and the accompanying supervision ratios (25:1, 40:1, 80:1, and 160:1), and reporting requirements were determined based on a number of risk factors for absconding, risk of any arrest, and risk of VFO arrest. Sex offenders classified as SIST cases are supervised at a 10:1 ratio and are included in the Level 1 category. Sex offenders and discretionary mental health cases are also supervised at Level 1.
- On December 31, 2012, 26% of parolees on the street were supervised at COMPAS Supervision Level 1 (25:1), 22% at Level 2 (40:1), 30% at Level 3 (80:1), and 20% at Level 4 (160:1).
- In the last five years (2008 through 2012), the number of ultimate violation process outcomes for parole violators with sustained charges decreased by 13%, from 15,247 in 2008 to 13,242 in 2012. The majority (86%) were ordered to prison, Willard or an Alternative 90 or 45 Day Program while 14% were revoked and restored to the street or a program in the community.

- The number of parolees returned to prison for new felony convictions annually has declined 36% since 2003. The number of parolees returned to prison for violating the conditions of parole has increased 7% during the same time period.
- While 26% of the parolees being supervised were Level 1, 41% of the parolees returned to prison were Level 1. Conversely, 21% of parolees were supervised at Level 4, but only 6% of returns to prison were Level 4.
- At the end of 2012, there were 1,389 parolees from New York who were being supervised out of state under the Interstate Compact.
- At the end of 2012, there were 1,050 parolees from other states who were being actively supervised in New York under the Interstate Compact.

Section 1 – Parolees Released to Community Supervision

There are four major mechanisms through which parolees are released from incarceration to parole supervision in the community: 1) Board of Parole decision, 2) Presumptive Release, 3) Conditional Release, and 4) Other Release. Board releases are the result of the Parole Board making decisions to release parolees from prison to parole supervision. Board releases include releases as a result of final deportation and Shock hearings. Presumptive releases are releases from prison in which the Commissioner of the Department of Corrections and Community Supervision (DOCCS) makes determinations that parolees should be released from prison after having served at least 5/6 of their minimum sentences. For these releases, the Board of Parole sets the conditions of parole supervision in the community. Conditional releases are releases in which parolees have reached their conditional release dates (typically 6/7 of a determinate sentence; 2/3 of an indeterminate sentence) and are automatically released from prison on that date, unless good time has been lost while in prison. The Other Release category includes: being on parole supervision in another state and requesting movement to New York (Cooperative cases), being judicially sentenced to parole supervision (i.e., Judicially Sentenced to the Willard Drug Treatment Campus), being a juvenile offender who ages into the adult criminal justice system and is placed on parole supervision, being placed on parole supervision directly from local jail, and being placed on a specialized sex offender caseload in the community after a determination is made by the court (SIST¹).

- There were 22,815 releases to supervision during 2012. This is a decrease of 10% from the 25,414 releases in 2003.
- In 2012, 6,224 or 27% of releases to community supervision were Board Releases. This is a decrease of 9,713, or 61%, since 2003 and a decrease of 6% since 2011. This decrease is primarily a result of the change in drug offender sentencing from indeterminate to determinate beginning in 2004.
- The number of conditional releases increased by 6,821 or 81% between 2003 and 2012. This is a result of changes in sentencing in New York which have changed primarily from indeterminate to determinate.

¹ SIST stands for Strict and Intensive Supervision and Treatment. Sex offender parolees can be placed on this type of community supervision caseload as part of the civil management process in New York. Parolees must be referred (usually by DOCCS) for civil management prior to release from prison or discharge from parole supervision and evaluated by the Office of Mental Health (OMH). If OMH determines that the parolee suffers from a “mental abnormality”, the case is referred to the Attorney General for possible litigation. If the Attorney General proceeds with litigation, the parolee is entitled to a jury trial; a unanimous verdict is required for a parolee to be involuntarily confined or placed under intensive supervision. If the court finds that the parolee warrants Civil Management, but can safely be supervised in the community, he or she will be allowed to live in the community while supervised on a SIST caseload, as long as he or she complies with all the conditions set by the Board of Parole, does not break the law and receives the treatment he or she needs. - Presumptive releases began in 2003 and peaked in 2005 at 2,075 releases. Since then, the number of presumptive releases has decreased by 96% to 80 releases in 2012 due to changes in sentencing law that made drug offenses determinate and therefore ineligible for presumptive release.
- Among Other Releases, the number of Juvenile Offenders decreased by 41% while the number of Judicially Sanctioned offenders increased by 34% between 2003 and 2012.
- Between 2003 and 2012, the proportion of VFO or A1 Violent Offenders released to community supervision increased from 28% to 39%. During the same period of time, the proportion of Drug Offenders released to community supervision decreased from 44% to 27%.
- The COMPAS supervision model was implemented in January 2012. The four supervision levels and the accompanying supervision ratios (25:1, 40:1, 80:1, and 160:1) and reporting requirements were determined based on a number of risk factors for absconding, risk of any arrest, and risk of VFO arrest. SIST cases are supervised at a 10:1 ratio and are included in the Level 1 category. Sex offenders and discretionary mental health cases are also supervised at Level 1.
- During 2012, 30% of offenders released to supervision were supervised at Level 1 (25:1), 24% were supervised at Level 2 (40:1), 25% at Level 3 (80:1) and 17% at Level 4 (160:1).
- The Hudson Valley and Western regions had the largest proportion of offenders supervised at Level 1 amongst releases during 2012 (35% and 34%, respectively). Twenty percent of all parolees supervised at Level 1 were released to the Western region.

Section 2 – Parolees Under Community Supervision

This section presents information about parolees who were under supervision as of December 31 of a particular year. This population reflects parolees under active supervision and, except where specifically reported, excludes parolees who are incarcerated in DOCCS facilities. Parolees on temporary release from prison and in community preparation status are excluded from the figures.

- Since 2007, the active parolee population under community supervision has declined 14% from 42,367 to 36,577. This reduction is consistent with the 14% decrease in the prison population during the same time period.
- On December 31, 2012, there were 630 parolees incarcerated in DOCCS facilities. The majority of these individuals (79%) were housed in Parole Program Facilities, including Willard, Edgecombe, Hudson, and Orleans.
- While the total number of parolees under community supervision decreased between 2007 and 2012, the number of parolees under community supervision for violent offenses increased from 16,527 (39%) at the end of 2007 to 18,126 (50%) at the end of 2012.
- The number of parolees under community supervision for drug offenses decreased 41% from 15,830 at the end of 2007 to 9,274 at the end of 2012.
- On December 31, 2012, forty percent of the 630 incarcerated parolees were under supervision for Property and Other offenses, followed closely by Drug Offenses (39%).
- Half (50%) of the parolees under community supervision on December 31, 2012 were African-American. The median age of these parolees was 37 and half (50%) were from New York City. The large majority (93%) of parolees under supervision were male.
- Two-thirds of parolees under community supervision had a drug abuse history.
- Of the parolees under community supervision, 2,611 or 7% were registered sex offenders.
- Seven percent, or 2,383 of parolees under community supervision at the end of 2012, were female. Among female parolees, 31% were convicted of a Legislative VFO. The next largest crime category was Drug Offenses, which represented 29% of the female parolees.
- On December 31, 2012, there were 83 Juvenile Offenders under community supervision.
- On December 31, 2012, 26% of parolees on the street were supervised at COMPAS Supervision Level 1 (25:1), 22% at Level 2 (40:1), 30% at Level 3 (80:1), and 20% at Level 4 (160:1).



Figure 2. Community Supervision Population by Crime Type



OFFENDERS UNDER COMMUNITY SUPERVISION

DECEMBER 31

The proportion of Violent Felony Offenders and A1 Violent Offenders among those under supervision has increased in recent years primarily due to early discharge options for non-violent offenders. As of December 31, 2012 half (50 percent) of all offenders under Community Supervision were Violent Felony Offenders while one-fourth (25 percent) were Drug Offenders.

Section 3 - VIOLATION PROCESS

There are three major outcomes associated with violations of the conditions of parole supervision: returns to prison, placement in alternative programs, and restoration to the community. A parolee can be ordered returned to prison to serve a time assessment imposed at a parole revocation hearing. It is possible that a parolee will serve the full time assessment in local jail rather than prison because he or she was also facing local criminal charges. Another sanction that can be imposed for the violation of parole supervision is placement in an alternative program, such as Willard. Finally, a parolee can have his or her parole supervision revoked, but be restored to community supervision, frequently with an additional condition to participate in specified programming in the community.

- Of the 15,696 warrants issued in 2012, 38% were issued to parolees supervised at Level 1, 31% at Level 2, 22% at Level 3 and 7% at Level 4. About half of the parolees under supervision were supervised at Level 1 or 2, but 69% of warrants issued were to individuals supervised at Levels 1 or 2.
- Between 2008 and 2012, the number of ultimate violation process outcomes for parole violators with sustained charges decreased by 13%, from 15,247 in 2008 to 13,242 in 2012. In 2012, the majority (86%) were ordered to prison, Willard or an Alternative 90 or 45 Day Program, while 14% were revoked and restored to the street or a program in the community.
- Between 2008 and 2012, the total violation outcomes in which a parolee was Ordered Returned to Prison, Willard or an Alternative program decreased from 88% to 86%.
- Parolees who had a parole violation that resulted in the revocation of parole supervision and return to prison make up the largest category of violation process outcomes. In 2012, 64% of violations resulted in a decision of Revoke and Ordered Returned to Prison.
- Between 2008 and 2012, the number of violations resulting in parolees being returned to prison decreased by 22%. During that time period, the proportion of Revoke and Ordered Returned to Prison decisions decreased from 69% to 64%.
- In 2008, 19% of violations resulted in placement at Willard (including the Alt 90 program) or in the Edgecombe Alt 45 program. By 2012, the proportion of violations resulting in placement in these programs increased to 22%.



Section 4 – PAROLEES REMOVED FROM COMMUNITY SUPERVISION

Parolees are removed from community supervision as a result of being returned to prison for violating the conditions of release, being convicted of a new offense, or successfully discharged. Parolees are successfully discharged after reaching their Maximum Expiration date, thereby completing their sentence, or prior to the completion of their sentence through one of the early discharge mechanisms, including Merit Termination², Mandatory Termination³, and Board Three Year Discharge⁴.

- In 2012, 55% of parolees removed from Community Supervision were discharged. This is a decrease from 58% in 2003.
- There were 13,095 discharges from Community Supervision in 2012. The majority of these discharges, 8,681 or 66%, were parolees who reached the Maximum Expiration of their sentences. This is a lower proportion than in 2003 when 69% of discharges were a result of a maximum expiration of sentence.
- 28% of parolees discharged in 2012 (3,679) received an early discharge. This is an increase from 2003, when 22% of parolees received an early discharge.
- In 2012, 45% of parolees removed from Community Supervision were returned to prison. This is an increase from 42% in 2003 and a decrease from a high of 47% in 2007.
- The number of parolees returned to prison for new felony convictions annually has declined 36% since 2003, from 2,134 to 1,367. These returns made up 6% of all removals from supervision in 2012, down from 8% in 2003.
- There were 9,296 rule violators removed from community supervision in 2012, including 1,812 parolees sent to the Alternate 90 Day and Alternate 45 Day programs. This is a decline of 10% since 2008. These returns comprised 39% of all removals from supervision in 2012, up from 34% in 2003.
- Among the 53,284 parolees who spent time under active supervision in 2012, 2.6% were returned to prison with new court convictions. This represents a decrease from 3.8% in 2003.
- In 2012, 17% of the 53,284 parolees who spent time under active supervision were returned to prison as rule violators. This is an increase from 15% in 2003.

² For those under DOCCS community supervision for a felony drug conviction, a mandatory termination of sentence must be granted, by law, after either two or three continuous years of unrevoked suspension, with the time period dependent upon the felony class of the instant offense.

³ DOCCS has the discretionary authority to discharge eligible non-violent offenders from their sentence after either one or two continuous years of unrevoked supervision, depending upon the felony class of the instant offense.

⁴ The Board of Parole has the authority to grant discharge prior to the expiration of sentence to statutorily eligible offenders under DOCCS community supervision following three continuous years of unrevoked suspension.

- Since 2003, the proportion of A1 Violent/Legislative VFO offenders among parolees returned with new convictions increased from 25% to 43% while the proportion of Drug Offenders decreased from 50% to 28%. This is consistent with the changes in the representation of these offenses among the supervised population.
- Similar to returns for new convictions, since 2003, the proportion of A1 Violent/Legislative VFO offenders amongst rule violators returned to prison has steadily increased from 25% to 42% while the proportion of Drug Offenders has decreased from 48% to 27%.
- Among 2012 returns to prison, there was an inverse relationship between supervision level and rate of return. For example, 41% of returns were among offenders supervised at Level 1, while 6% of returns were among offenders supervised at Level 4.
- While 48% of parolees under supervision on December 31, 2012 were supervised at Level 1 or 2, 71% of parolees returned to prison were supervised at Levels 1 or 2.

The number of Drug Offenders returned to prison after conviction of a new felony has decreased by 64 percent since 2003. This reflects the combined impact of decreases in the drug offender population under supervision and significant numbers of drug offenders returned for rule violations before they commit new crimes. In 2012, 387 Drug Offenders were returned to DOCCS for committing new crimes.

In 2012, 3,889 Violent Felony Offenders were returned to prison for rule violations. As the proportion of Drug Offenders under supervision has decreased, the number of drug offenders returned to prison for rule violations has also decreased. In 2003, nearly half (48%) of all rule violation returns were drug offenders. In 2012, less than one-third (27%) of rule violation returns were drug offenders.

Section 5 – PAROLEES SUPERVISED OUT OF STATE

- At the end of 2012, there were 1,291 parolees from New York who were being actively supervised out of state under the Interstate Compact.
- Between 2008 and 2012, the number of parolees being supervised out of state decreased by 174 or 12%.
- During 2012, 681 parolees were transferred out of New York to complete their community supervision under the Interstate Compact. This is a decrease of 54 or 7% from the 735 transfers in 2011.

Section 6 – PAROLEES SUPERVISED FROM OTHER STATES

- At the end of 2012, there were 1,050 parolees from other states who were being actively supervised in New York under the Interstate Compact.
- Between 2008 and 2012, the number of parolees from other states being supervised increased by 200 or 24%.
- During 2012, 544 parolees were transferred from other states to New York to complete their community supervision under the Interstate Compact. This is an increase of 23 or 4% from the 521 transfers in 2011.
