DOCS Temporarily Consolidates 22 Housing Units at 17 Facilities

The Department of Correctional Services temporarily consolidated 22 under-populated inmate housing units at 17 correctional facilities in March 2010 in response to the State's continuing inmate population decline.

The consolidations will achieve additional savings for State taxpayers since the 22 vacated housing units will not require staffing. Inmates from the vacated units were transferred to vacant beds in other, staffed housing units without requiring the addition of any beds. Correction Officers previously assigned to the vacated units were reassigned to vacant posts elsewhere in their current facility; no employees were required to transfer.

The plan is helping reduce DOCS' overtime expenses because there are now fewer vacant posts requiring coverage. Commissioner Brian Fischer selected the housing units at facilities where staff attrition has left positions vacant, thereby avoiding the need for any transfers. The consolidations did not result in any layoffs.

The consolidations, as well as reconfigurations at Clinton and Collins Correctional Facilities, will allow DOCS to leave 142 Correction Officer positions temporarily unfilled. On an annual basis, that translates to State taxpayer savings of approximately \$8 million, not counting the cost of benefits.

Commissioner Fischer took the action in light of the continued decline in the State prison population, which has dropped by almost 20 percent, or about 14,000 offenders, in the last decade, and by four percent, or 2,400 offenders, in the last year alone.

The consolidations have taken 1,023 general confinement beds temporarily off line. DOCS vacated one 60-bed housing unit at each of the following facilities, all of which are men's medium security prisons: Altona, Bare Hill, Cape Vincent, Gouverneur, Livingston, Riverview, Washington and Wyoming. The Department also vacated one 41-bed housing unit at Adirondack, two units with a total of 120 beds at Franklin, two units with a total of 26 beds at Groveland, one 55-bed unit at Mohawk, one 43-bed unit at Mt. McGregor, two units with a total of 92 beds at Oneida and two units with a total of 46 beds at Watertown, all of which are also men's medium security facilities. Additionally, DOCS vacated two units with a total of 72 beds at the women's medium-security Albion and one 48-bed unit at the minimum security portion of the men's Butler Correctional Facilities.

At the men's maximum security Clinton, DOCS is preparing to take 77 general confinement beds off line permanently in the former medical building and renovate the space to house the program area for an enhanced Intermediate Care Program unit for offenders with mental health treatment needs.

Message from the Commissioner

As the State's fiscal difficulties continue, DOCS, as New York's largest direct service agency, will continue to be required to save money and find efficiencies. It is my ongoing aim to meet these demands with as little disruption as possible to our staff, which, as I have noted before, has continued to carry out our mission with the utmost professionalism during a challenging time. I also intend to limit, to the extent possible, any reductions in DOCS' nationally recognized programming, which provides inmates the treatment, education and job skills they will need to turn their lives around not only for their own benefit but for society's, and which enhances our correctional facilities' safety and security by keeping inmates productively occupied.

Difficult times invite criticism. When we are confronted with factual concerns, we respond appropriately and professionally. But we will neither accept unfounded, unfair criticism nor allow it to diminish our efforts in carrying out our mission.

We are always looking where we can to contain costs. For example, we are reducing certain transportation routes in response to the continuing inmate population drop. We have begun purchasing lower-cost electricity

directly from the Independent System Operator, through the Office of General Services (OGS), for Marcy, Mohawk, Oneida, Ogdensburg and Cape Vincent Correctional Facilities, and we expect to expand that arrangement to more facilities. And, working with OGS, we secured space in the Utica State Office Building to provide

Western New York-based DOCS Inspector General's Office field investigators a closer and more cost-efficient spot than Albany to complete their confidential reports.

Looking at the big picture, I commend all employees who have recognized the need to economize and acted accordingly; the agency's total travel costs in 2009-10 were down by more than 45 percent from 2007-08.

There is no question this is a time of contraction for the State prison system. I am pleased we have been able to find ways to save – nearly \$300 million over the last two full State fiscal years – without any security staff layoffs and only minimal civilian layoffs. We must continue these laudable efforts. It is a tribute to all of us that despite the demands that we downsize, we have maintained the most professional staff and robust programming of any prison system in the nation.

Edgecombe Expands Treatment Program to 45 Days, Adds 10 Beds

Edgecombe Residential Treatment Facility has expanded its treatment service program to 45 days, from 30 days, and added 10 beds to bring its capacity to 110.

The program is aimed at helping parolees who are at risk of violating terms of their parole because of a relapse of alcohol and/or substance abuse to identify behaviors that prevent their successful re-entry into society. The extended timeframe, which took effect April 5, 2010, allows case managers to become more familiar with participants and permits more effective intake assessment and discharge planning. The 15 extra days also allow Odyssey House, the Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services (OASAS)-certified treatment provider, to offer more enhanced programming, including wellness self-management, art therapy and the relapse prevention lec-



ture series by internationally-renowned therapist Terence T. Gorski.

DOCS, OASAS, the Division of Parole and the Division of Criminal Justice Services collaborated to convert Edgecombe into a parole graduated sanction treatment facility in April 2008. The 10 extra beds were added February 4, 2010.

Edgecombe's location in Upper Manhattan allows for the many participants from the New York City area to receive treatment in their home communities and to benefit from visits from family members via public transportation. Representatives of social service, employment and vocational agencies also visit the facility to initiate contact with parolees before release.

DOCS Completes Phone System Change; Rates Reduced Again

After many months of litigation and contract protests, the changeover of the inmate telephone system to DOCS' new vendor, Unysis, was completed in March 2010, giving all inmates the opportunity to place collect phone calls or pre-paid calls at the new, lower rate of five cents per minute with no connection charges.

The cost of an average 20-minute phone call drops from \$2.64 to 96 cents under the new system.

The switch to Unysis began in January 2010 at Hudson Correctional Facility, where the new system was tested for a month before being rolled out to other facilities. The full rollout was completed within 75 days and has already prompted a major increase in the volume of calls. The ability for inmates to communicate with family members and loved ones while incarcerated is a critical

component of re-entry, which emphasizes the importance of offenders maintaining strong family ties.

DOCS is working with Unysis to ensure that family members are aware of all of the services that are available with the new system, which allows them to establish prepaid accounts in addition to receiving collect calls if they desire, at the same low rate of five cents per minute (compared with seven cents per minute and a \$1.28 connection fee for each call under the old system). The Department and Unysis are also developing, in conjunction with family advocacy groups, a consumer education program designed to ensure that family members understand their phone bills. Both DOCS and Unysis are focused on providing family members with information about how to make the best use of the new system and maximize their savings.

Cardinal Confirms Inmates, Leads Mass at Arthur Kill

DOCS, Columbia Blaze Trail With MRSA Prison Study

DOCS is collaborating with Columbia University Medical Center on a pioneering study about the transmission of MRSA in prisons that could yield information of international significance.

DOCS and Columbia began studying the transmission of methicillin-resistant *Staphylococcus aureus* (MRSA) at Sing Sing and Bedford Hills Correctional Facilities in Autumn 2009. Developed by DOCS Deputy Commissioner/Chief Medical Officer Dr. Lester N. Wright and Drs. Frank Lowy and Elaine Larson of Columbia, the first-of-its-kind study aims to gain a greater understanding of the risk factors and how MRSA may be transmitted inside prisons.

The findings will have major implications for public health since millions of inmates return to the community every year from prisons around the world. The Columbia study, funded through a \$3.5 million, five-year grant from the National Institutes of Health, aims to determine how many inmates enter New York's prison system already carrying the MRSA bacteria and whether risk factors within prison increase the spread of *S. aureus*.

Bedford Hills and Sing Sing inmates are invited to participate voluntarily. Participants are interviewed briefly about their daily activities and medical histories; their noses and throats are gently swabbed. Members of the research staff will review each participant's medical chart. Any information collected from inmates will be kept confidential.

Researchers plan to reach as many inmates as are willing to volunteer. The study is expected to continue for the next four years.

Upstate C.F. Graduates First Inmate Parenting Class



Upstate Correctional Facility held its first Parenting Program graduation ceremony on January 14, 2010. Inmates (L-R) Trent Harris, Ricardo Gonzalez, Charles Johnson, Jimmy Sanders, Timothy Lando, Reinaldo Berrocal, Sherrod Craft and Shahein Clay, as well as Luther Jordan (not pictured), completed the 11-week program. The participants said the program gave them insights into themselves to become better fathers and helped them maintain closer ties with their children, many of whom visited during the program. Upstate counselors Bethany McCarthy and Lisa Demarse, who brought the Parenting class to the maximum security disciplinary prison, urged the graduates to advertise the program to the other fathers at the facility.

DOCS is also planning to permanently remove the underused 110-bed protective custody unit at the men's medium security Collins and transfer any remaining inmates to other protective custody units operated by the Department. The removal will allow for the restructuring of programs into a central location at Collins.

Some of the facilities impacted by the March 2010 consolidations also had units vacated in late 2008 as part of consolidations of 48 housing units at 21 facilities then.

As of this publication, Governor David A. Paterson and the Legislature were still negotiating a final budget for the fiscal year that began April 1. The Executive Budget called for savings through housing unit consolidation. It also called for the closure of Butler Minimum and the men's minimum security Lyon Mountain Correctional Facility on January 31, 2011, and the men's medium security Ogdensburg and men's minimum security Moriah Shock Incarceration Correctional Facilities on March 31, 2011. The closures would permanently remove 1,362 beds, 414 of which are already off-line due to consolidation, and would reduce DOCS' staff by an estimated 572 positions.

Mechanic Honored for Therapy Cube Flip-Up Desktop

DOCS is leasing former prison farmland to area farmers and has turned over farmland at Green Haven Correctional Facility to the Division of Military and Naval Affairs (DMNA) for a future support and maintenance operation.

The Office of General Services (OGS) has signed leases with six local farmers to keep former prison farmland productive, including 270 acres at Green Haven Correctional Facility, 315 at Eastern, 447 at Wallkill, 234.5 at Wyoming, 223 at Greene and 67.5 at Elmira.

The leases yielded more than \$100,000 in revenue in the first year since DOCS closed its 12 prison farms in 2008. DOCS also entered into haying agreements with local farmers to keep viable former farm properties for which the State was unable to complete lease agreements at Clinton, Eastern, Elmira, Fishkill, Mid-State and Washington Correctional Facilities. The haying agreements yielded an additional \$11,500. Also, DOCS is planning to transfer about 300 acres with some improvements at Groveland Correctional Facility to the State University of New York at Alfred to enhance its agriculture education program.

OGS opened bids in April 2010 for agricultural leases at five former prison farms, at Clinton, Eastern, Elmira, Sullivan and Washington Correctional Facilities. The State continues to pursue long-term leases for all the former prison

farms with the aim of keeping the land productive. DOCS will pursue haying agreements where leases can't be negotiated.

At Green Haven, DOCS transferred 85 acres to DMNA for a \$32.7 million, 100,000 square-foot combined support and maintenance building for the New York Army National Guard, with two acres to be used for military vehicle parking and one acre for private vehicle parking. The facility will be federally funded through the efforts of United States Representative John Hall. It will join similar operations at Fort Drum, Rochester and Staten Island and will be used to maintain and repair wheeled military vehicles, equipment, communications devices and weapons. No ammunition will be stored at the Green Haven site, which will include a perimeter fence with a gate, as well as a suitable buffer zone between the new facility and the prison.

The National Guard plan has the support of the Dutchess County Economic Development Corporation, which noted the land is already off local tax rolls as State-owned property, and Beekman Town Supervisor Daniel J. French, who extolled the benefits of 150 to 200 construction jobs during the building phase and 75 to 100 permanent full-time jobs at the facility with an estimated annual economic impact of \$4 million to \$7 million.

Orthopedic Contract Enhances Services for Inmates While Saving Money for Taxpayers

The DOCS Division of Health Services' Coordinated Specialty Care Program is enhancing constitutionally-required medical services while saving taxpayers a projected \$223,000 annually through a new contract that will provide on-site orthopedic services for inmates at Elmira, Southport and Five Points Correctional Facilities. The contract DOCS signed with Ithaca Orthopedic Group on April 8, 2010 also provides for

scans for inmates from Five Points, Auburn and Cayuga Correctional Facilities at the group's North Elmira offices, where spine and pain management services will be provided to inmates as well. The on-site orthopedic clinics will provide inmates with needed bone, joint, ligament, tendon and nerve treatments at a reduced cost, while also reducing the need to transport inmates for outside procedures.

The nearly 2,000 DOCS employees who report to Downstate, Fishkill and Beacon Correctional Facilities work in the shadow of Mt. Beacon, where six military veterans died in a Navy plane crash about 150 feet from the summit on their way home just months after the end of World War II.

Commodore Dixie Kiefer, a Pacific naval hero known as "Captain Dixie" to millions who saw the wartime documentary film "Fighting Lady," is by far the best-known of those who died in the November 12, 1945 crash in the fog.

But Dr. William Stolfi, a Dentist 4 at Downstate who researched the incident, was troubled that the other five men who died that day did not seem to be mentioned by name in any accounts of the crash, or even in a past memorial. So he and fellow Downstate employees Richard Klyszejko, a Clinical Physician 2, Joseph Tortora, a Correction Counselor, and Rev. Alfred R. Twyman Jr., Chaplain, climbed Mt. Beacon on Veterans Day 2009, bushwhacking their way to the site of the crash. There, they posted a ¼-inch aluminum decking plate plaque covered with Plexiglas and planted six American flags to honor all six men. Rev. Twyman, a retired Navy Commander, led a prayer service.

According to The New York Times, it took 200 military personnel eight hours to cut a path to the crash site at elevation 1,400 feet in the aftermath of the accident. There is still no trail to the site.

Dr. Stolfi said that when he served in the Navy, he frequently flew in the same kind of Beachcraft twin engine plane as the one that crashed on Mt. Beacon. He said he had heard Commodore Kiefer's plane was still on the mountain and wanted to find it.

Along with the plaque and the flags, the Downstate staffers posted an encased copy of the Times' story at the site of the wreckage, which remains. They also posted the names of all six men killed: Lieutenant Commander Ignatius Zielinski, 44, of Salem, Mass.; Lieutenant Paul Lloyd, 23, of Colorado Springs, Colo.; Lieutenant Junior Grade Hans K. Kohler, 25, of Garfield, N.J.; Aviation Machinist's Mate Clarence Hooper, 23, of Greensboro, N.C.; Seaman First Class David O. Wood of North Franklin, Ct.; and Commodore Kiefer, 49, of Blackfoot, Idaho.

The plane was transporting the six men from Caldwell, N.J., to their home base in Quonset, R.I. Commodore Kiefer had survived a Kamikaze attack off Formosa in which he was hit with 65 pieces of shrapnel. His ship lost 144 men, and 200 others were injured.

DOH Reviewing HIV, AIDS, Hep C Treatment

The Department of Health (DOH) will conduct a review this Spring of State correctional facilities' policies and practices in the prevention and treatment of HIV, AIDS, and Hepatitis C prevention. The public, including inmates, their families, and advocates, are invited to provide DOH with relevant information in writing via email to docservrev@health.state.ny.us or by regular mail to "DOCS Review, P.O. Box 2112, Empire Plaza Station, Albany, NY 12220." Information must be received no later than June 15, 2010 in order to be considered in the DOH review, which is being conducted in accordance with Public Health Law § 206(26).

Going Green: Building, Manufacturing, Recycling, Job Training

DOCS continues going green on numerous levels, from new construction and expanded recycling efforts to green job training for inmates and staff.

The Residential Mental Health Unit (RMHU) program and office building that opened at Marcy Correctional Facility December 15, 2009 is the “greenest” of any American correctional building, and the Department’s second RMHU, under construction at Five Points Correctional Facility, expects to match Marcy’s “Silver” certification level from the U.S. Green Building Council.

The 100-bed, 57,000 square-foot Marcy RMHU, whose design and construction was managed by the Office of General Services under DOCS’ direction, achieved LEED-NC 2.2 status, signifying the highest level of energy efficiency, conservation and environmental preservation of a correctional building in the nation to date.

The Silver status was based on a projected 26 percent reduction in energy use compared to a baseline energy code-compliant building, including a projected 24 percent water use reduction, the use of refrigerants containing no ozone-depleting chemicals, the use of recycled materials for 33 percent of all building content, and low volatile organic compound-emitting carpeting, adhesives, sealants and paint.

At Five Points, construction began on its 69,470-square foot, 60-bed RMHU building (housing, programs and offices) in Fall 2009. Installation of cells is expected to begin this summer and the building is expected to open in Spring 2011.

Meantime, DOCS’ Vocational Education Department is training Vocational Building Maintenance and Carpentry instructors to teach inmates the kind of green job skills that are in increasing demand - as evidenced in the construction of the RMHUs.

Fourteen instructors attended five-day federally-funded “boot camp” training sessions for entry level weatherization and home performance field technicians at the New York State Weatherization Directors Association in Syracuse in February and March 2010. Another group of six is scheduled for May 17-21. DOCS aims to use federal Career and Technical Education Improvement Act funds to provide Weatherization training to all its Vocational Building Maintenance and Carpentry instructors by Fall 2010 or Spring of 2011, and to

buy the equipment required to teach inmates weatherization techniques.

The training involves learning state-of-the-art methods in the installation of weatherization materials and construction through classroom presentations and hands-on lab work with simulated real-life

scenarios. Training sessions include Introduction to Building Science Principles and Air Sealing Techniques, Installing High Density and Loose Fill Cellulose Insulation, and Lead Safe Work Practices.

Newly-trained instructors will help DOCS revise its Vocational Building Maintenance and Carpentry curriculum to include a weatherization component. DOCS expects to introduce the Weatherization trade field into the Building Maintenance and Carpentry shops at more than three dozen correctional facilities.

Beacon Correctional Facility launched DOCS’ ninth recycling center February 22, 2010. The operation, where seven inmates load recyclable materials from Downstate, Fishkill and Beacon Correctional Facilities for transport across the Hudson River to the Wallkill Correctional Facility recycling center, is expected to save taxpayers more than \$50,000 annually through a combination of reduced garbage hauling fees and revenues from the sale of recycled material. The Beacon center may eventually serve the entire Green Haven Hub.
